



Notification under section 49(4) of the Communications Act 2003

Draft decision by the Forest of Dean District Council in response to a proposal by British Telecommunications plc for the removal of public call boxes pursuant to Part 2 of the Schedule to a Direction published by Ofcom on 14 March 2006 ('the Direction').

1. The Forest of Dean District Council, in accordance with section 49(4) of the Communications Act 2003 ('the Act'), hereby make the following draft decision in response to a proposal by British Telecommunications plc for the removal of public call boxes pursuant to Part 2 of the Direction.
2. The draft decision is set out in the Schedule to this Notification.
3. The effect of, and the Forest of Dean District Council reasons for making, the draft decision is set out in the Schedule to this Notification.
4. The Forest of Dean District Council consider that the draft decision complies with the requirements of sections 45 to 50 of the Act, as appropriate and relevant to the proposal.
5. In making the draft decision, the Forest of Dean District Council has considered and acted in accordance with the six community requirements in section 4 of the Act.

The telephone box at the junction of Templeway West meets all of the "reasonable needs" criteria by virtue of the fact that it exceeds the minimum number of calls criteria specified by BT; is the only one within 800 metres; there are at least 500 households within 1 kilometre and should therefore not be removed.

Not everyone has a mobile phone, a charged mobile phone or a charged mobile phone with credit in an emergency, and Plump Hill often blocked with snow in hard Winter.

There is no dependable mobile service/network signal in the village, hence no reliable mobile coverage. There is no other public phone box in the vicinity. The box has been used to make calls within the last year. Removal of this kiosk would be detrimental to the village.

Removal of this kiosk would be detrimental to the village</p> <p>The phone signal is low, BTs point about the provision for making emergency calls even in the absence of a working network is totally invalid if an individual does not have a mobile phone. Many people in parts of the forest without useable phone coverage will tend not to have a mobile phone. Until mobile phone coverage is established the phone box should remain, it remains impossible to make a call or even send or receive a text. A short distance from the phone box is a defibrillator mounted on the outside of the White Horse Pub and in order to get access to the defibrillator in an emergency it is necessary to dial 999. Located on a country road which is a known accident black spot, a low population and poor mobile signal. Consider if when road accident occurs it would be difficult to contact emergency services</p>
